



ABOUT THE CORYDON SKATEPARK



Gary Graves and Sam Miller have been local skateboarders in Corydon, Indiana for nearly 2 decades, have been residents of Harrison County for 32 years and have an excellent understanding on why Corydon needs a skatepark. Leading a grassroots effort, Gary and Sam contacted the Town of Corydon to discuss their ideas for a skatepark in Downtown Corydon.

The **Town of Corydon**, looking for opportunities to redevelop the former Gerdon Auto Property, agreed to donate the property and hire a consultant to help design the park. **Hunger Skateparks** designed a 8,000 square foot skatepark that features a multi-pocketed bowl and a long, tiered flow/street section. The design was inspired by comments from 153 non-skater/rider community members and parents in a community survey, public input meetings, and by 99 local skatepark advocates leading the charge who currently have to travel outside Harrison County to skate. The skatepark site straddles the Little Indian Creek and expands the adjacent public park that includes a new pedestrian bridge, soft scape interactive playground, a recently restored WPA community building and a walking loop trail.

Comments shared in the community survey include:

- •This skatepark will be an outlet for so many people, it will be a safe space to many. In a small town like this, everyone deserves a safe space. We've got coffee shops, regular parks, movie theatres, (and) hotels. It's time to provide an outlet for creative kids, adults, etc.
- •It would give and create opportunities for kids or anyone interested in the sport to practice improving skills in a safe, sanctioned area where there's positive vibes and support from local skaters around.
- •This skatepark will give the local community a place to go and practice skating in a safe and designated area. No more liabilities and skaters skating on city and private property. A safe place for people to skate is very important.
- •We live right across the bridge in Meade County (and do) not have a skate park. Right now we have to drive an hour or more for my son to ride and it would be amazing to have one this close!
- •This has been a long time coming! The youth of the city need more outlets.
- •This is important to me because BMX and action sports are such a big deal in my life; it has helped me when I struggle with anxiety and stress. Also, it would be so beneficial for the community to come together!
- •Me and my friends don't have a really good skatepark within 1 hour of us; this would make it so much easier to go for longer.
- •Thank you for considering a skatepark. I go to many skateparks and am always pleasantly surprised at the camaraderie and diversity of the people who use the park. Parks draw (people) from around the region like myself who will no doubt spend money at other places like restaurants and shops. Hunger's approach to park designing and building involves a high level of collaboration in order to develop projects unique to the community it will serve. Hunger Skateparks highest aim is not to build parks that few have the ability to enjoy, but to create balanced and creative parks that inspire a large audience. A successful park is a well-used park.
